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A Rich Musical Note

Today we reincorporate into our 11:15 a.m. Eucharist the ancient hymn of praise Gloria in excelsis Deo, or "Glory to God in the highest." Dating from at least the fourth century, this canticle begins with words sung by the angels proclaiming Christ's birth to the shepherds in the Gospel of St. Luke. By the eleventh or twelfth century, the Gloria was routinely sung on Sundays and Feast Days in the Roman Rite. Although sung near the beginning of the Communion Service in the original 1549 Book of Common Prayer, Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Cranmer placed it between the post-communion prayer and final blessing in the revision of 1552. Cranmer likened the Gloria to the hymn Christ and his disciples sang after the Last Supper. The most recent Book of Common Prayer (1979) restored the Gloria to a place within the entrance rite of the Communion Service on Sundays and Feast Days, and it is to be omitted during Advent and Lent.

The music in today's service is a celebration of American composer, organist, and choir director Robert J. Powell. Born in Benoit, Mississippi in 1932, Powell's graduate studies were at Union Theological Seminary in New York, and he served as assistant organist to Alec Wyton at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. He served as Director of Music and Organist of Christ Church, Greenville, South Carolina, from 1968-2003. Powell's compositions span nearly all genres of church music, from organ voluntaries to choir anthems and service music. Some of his service music appears in The Hymnal 1982, the official hymnal of the Episcopal Church, including the *Glory to God*, *Holy*, *holy*, *holy*, and *Lamb of God* settings used today.

Today we also hear Powell's An American Tribute: A Suite of Patriotic Songs for organ and trumpet. In this collection of five movements, Powell cleverly weaves together a number of hymns and patriotic songs, including "Taps." Listen carefully for many others!
