## The First Lesson | Jeremiah 29:1, 4 – 7

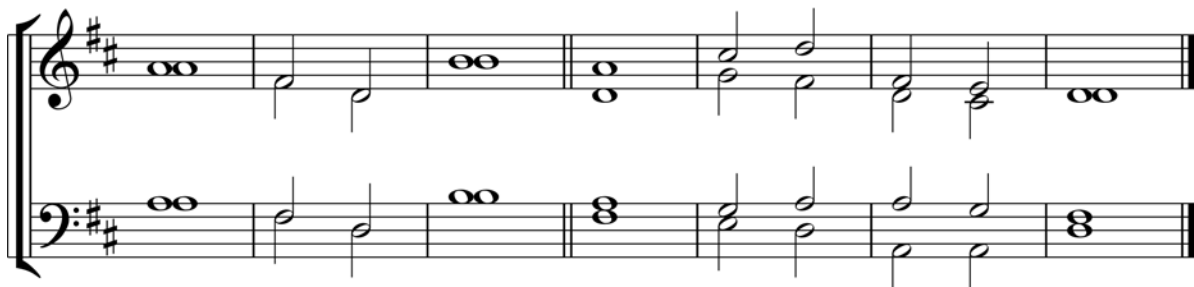

Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

## The Gospel | Luke 17:11 – 19

*People* That they may be delivered from their distress.

*Intercessor* I ask your prayers for those who have died *(The names of those who have died will be read aloud)*. Are there others who have died? Lord, give to the departed eternal rest;

*People* Let light perpetual shine upon them.

*Intercessor* We praise you for your saints who have entered into joy;

*People* May we also come to share in your heavenly kingdom.

## Concluding Collect |

*Celebrant* Lord, hear the prayers of your people: and what we have asked faithfully, grant that we may obtain effectually, to the glory of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All this we ask through Jesus Christ our Savior. By whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and forever. **AMEN.**
