The First Lesson | Exodus 3:1–15

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-inlaw Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." The Second Lesson | 1 Corinthians 10:1–13

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.

Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them

did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

Music Note

Early Christians observed "a season of penitence and fasting" in preparation for the Paschal feast, commonly called Easter (The Book of Common Prayer, pp. 265–265). As we enter the season of Lent, our music will reflect the more somber, penitential nature of this holy time. In earlier times, the use of the organ was limited or even outright forbidden during Lent. Often a sensible compromise would allow it to gently support singing. At All Saints' we acknowledge this ancient practice by refraining from organ postludes or concluding voluntaries during Lent. The instrument will also remain silent as the Book of Gospels is processed from the nave back to the altar.

Our Lenten services will also be marked by the sacred sound of plainsong, sometimes called Gregorian chant. The adult choirs will sing the psalms to simple plainsong tones throughout Lent. The myriad ancient volumes of plainsong comprise some of the oldest notated music, now considered the very foundation of all Western music. The beauty of these melodies has inspired musicians to the present day, including African American composer David Hurd. A former Professor of Church Music at General Theological Seminary, Hurd remains one of the most prolific composers active in The Episcopal Church. We will sing the Kyrie, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei from his New Plainsong Mass throughout Lent.

Stations of the Cross

During Lent, original art representing the fourteen Stations of the Cross is installed in the All Saints' nave by the Arts Theology Committee. The stations refer to fourteen key events at the end of Jesus' life, from the moment he is condemned to die, through his suffering, death on the cross, and burial. During Sunday worship in Lent, we pray that this art may serve as a visual story-teller, and a companion in prayer as we walk the Way of the Cross. We have also created a short liturgy to accompany each of the fourteen stations, and you are invited to pray this liturgy during the first three days of Holy Week, April 11, 12, and 13, 1:00–3:00 p.m.

A Reflection on Lent: from Bruce Garner

We are about to enter one of the most significant seasons of the church year: Lent. The word "Lent" is derived from an old English word meaning Spring. That is an appropriate connection since the end of Lent is Easter which generally falls during the spring season.

Lent consists of forty (40) days, which corresponds to the time Jesus spent in prayer and fasting in the wilderness following his baptism by John. The western church generally begins Lent with Ash Wednesday and ends it on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter. The counting of the 40 days does not include Sundays, since every Sunday is a "little Easter" and thus a feast day. That allows for the use of flowers on the altar during a time of penitence. (Other parts of Christendom, namely the Eastern branches, vary the beginning and end of Lent according to different calendars and how the days are counted.)

Lent is a season for repentance, prayer and fasting as well as taking on new disciplines to enhance one's spirituality and relationship with God. Historically, people abstained from or "gave up" something for Lent. While being an admirable path to follow, more recently people have explored taking on a discipline to enhance their spiritual life. Some take on the discipline of daily prayer, whether morning prayer, noonday or evening prayer, or a combination of one or more. Others begin a discipline of praying the Anglican Rosary or using some other physical object to help them focus their minds during prayer. Some begin using a labyrinth to focus their prayers and meditation. The possibilities are many and there is likely to be a discipline that fits everyone's needs. Very often, a discipline begun for Lent continues past the end of the season and becomes a daily discipline for the entire year.

Like the other seasons of the church year, Lent has its own liturgical colors. The most traditional color for hangings and vestments is purple, as we use at All Saints'. Our high altar is covered with what is called a full Jacobean frontal, meaning it covers all sides of the altar. (The very nature of the carvings and pediments in our church make it difficult to "tone down" the church to make it look more penitential. The full frontal helps do that.) Ours is a combination of a beige basketweave background with purple stripes (also called orphrey's). The other hangings are of the same design. Some churches opt to use hangings and vestments that are more of a flax color with red and black trim and decorations.

One common discipline used by most churches is to refrain from using the word "alleluia" at the end of the Gloria Patri and at the fraction of the bread during the Eucharist (per the rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer). Some even "give up" using the organ during worship and/or using less celebratory instrumentation during the season. The hymns for use during Lent reflect the nature of the season. Solemnity is the theme of the season.
